

You will create **three** short musical products 30 – 60 secs long:

- Instrumental Performance
- Original Piece of Music
- DAW arrangement (using loops)

Music Skills Development

Consists of one task, where you will develop your musical skills choosing from two musical disciplines

- Music performance
- Creating original music
- Music Production You will create a **portfolio** documenting how you developed your skills and your work

Developmental process continued

Next, I added a flute as I wanted my composition to feature orchestral woodwind instruments, this is because classical, orchestral instruments are heavily featured in wedding music. The flute part follows the same melody as the piano melody but a slightly more simplified version. I wanted my piece to have many layers, so this is why I added another instrument to the verse to play a similar melody

The final addition to the verse was an acoustic guitar which again adds another layer, I used a strumming technique for the guitar which supports the skill in my skills audit where I describe my need for improvement in guitar techniques. The guitar uses the same chords as the piano, but they are played twice per bar instead of once to increase the speed. Overall, here is what the composition sounds and looks like at this stage.







Performance development

In the video on the right, I have used a warmup exercise advised by my plano teacher to prepare my hands/fingers for playing: this ensures the overall performance is to my best abilities.


In the video on the right, I have practiced Clair De Lune with only my right hand to perfect my performance; this ensures that I can play my right hand independently without relying on my left hand he performance. Overall, this strengthens my performance abilities.

In the video on the right. I have practiced and played the D flat scale on the right hand as that is the key signature my performance piece "Clair De Lune" is played in. This will enable my finer dexterity for the piece, and so my fingers can play independently. I used this as a warmup exercise,

have spent a few days learning/practicing part of Clair De Lune by Claude Debussy To improve this, I need to consider the dynamics and have my own interpretation of the song. I am planning or keeping the introduction as soft and delicate with "piano" dynamic which then progresses into "forte" to show

Non - Performing Careers

Artist Manager (£30,000 - £100,000 +)

Responsible for guiding the careers of musicians and ensuring they make the right decisions regarding contracts, tours, and promotions

A&R Rep (£30,000 - £80,000)

Responsible for discovering and nurturing musical talent. They scout for new artists, oversee the development of their careers, and help them secure record deals.

Music Lawyer (£40,000 - £100,000)

Provide legal counsel to artists, labels, and other music industry professionals. They negotiate contracts, protect intellectual property rights, and handle legal disputes

Music Journalist (£20,000 - £50,000)

Write about music, review albums and concerts, and interview musicians. They often work for music magazines, newspapers, websites, or broadcast media.






